




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VOLUNTEER STORIES

Volunteering abroad is an incredible and life-changing experience, that exposes us to seeing and doing things differently. I am now halfway through a volunteer placement with Projects Abroad Vietnam. It is a care placement, working in the special education classes at the Vietnam Friendship Village. The placement has exposed me to new learning, discoveries and understandings of special education in Vietnam, and has helped me to grow as a person with its share of challenges.

VOLUNTEER STORIES

Volunteering Abroad written by Marinette et Noémie, Medical Volunteer, France

Nous avons réalisé une mission de 3 semaines en Physiothérapie au centre de rééducation de THUY AN à 2h de route d'Hanoi. Nous avons pris en charge des enfants de 1 à 15 ans.

Une journée typique à THUY se résume à peu près comme cela : réveil le matin par notre cher obus qui fait office de cloche puis début des séances à 8h du matin jusqu'à 11h30. Nous aidions ensuite le personnel pour donner à manger aux enfants qui ne pouvaient pas se nourrir seuls. L'après-midi en salle de physiothérapie commençait à 14h jusqu'à 16h. Nous terminions la journée en aidant à nouveau le personnel à donner à manger aux enfants pour le repas du soir.

Nous avons particulièrement apprécié le fait d'être logées au sein même du centre. Nous étions donc plongées dans le quotidien des enfants qui vivaient au centre (distribution des repas, activités le soir).

Durant notre mission, nous avons pu réaliser une réunion avec le directeur du centre, le médecin référent, les phytothérapeutes ainsi qu'une grande partie du personnel soignant. Nous avons pu poser des questions sur le fonctionnement du centre mais aussi échanger sur nos techniques de traitement.





Les équipes soignantes sont très accueillantes, à l'écoute et ont toujours répondu à toutes nos questions en apportant à chaque fois les informations nécessaires pour la prise en charge des enfants. Nous avons aussi pu avoir des informations sur la culture vietnamienne, la langue mais aussi les coutumes du pays.

D'un point de vue personnel, nous avons vécu une expérience inoubliable et très enrichissante. Nous avons pu pratiquer notre métier dans un autre pays afin d'aider les enfants bien souvent les plus défavorisés dans des endroits isolés. Malgré la courte durée de notre séjour, il a été très gratifiant de voir l'évolution et l'épanouissement des enfants. Nous avons le sentiment d'avoir été utiles et écoutées et cela nous donne envie de renouveler l'expérience.
